

NEW HAMPSHIRE CAMPAIGN STOPS

Presidential primary candidates travel all over the state to talk to voters. Here are some of the places that all candidates try to visit.



The Balsams Grand Resort (Dixville Notch) and **Hart's Location:** These two places have a tradition of voting at midnight on election day.

State House (Concord): All candidates must come here to pay \$1000 to be on the ballot for the New Hampshire primary.

Claremont: This is an example of a "purple" town, where independent voters switch between voting for Republicans and Democrats, so making a good impression here is important.

Robie's Country Store (Hooksett): This building is a historic landmark and has been an important place for candidates doing retail politics to visit.

Exeter Town Hall: Abraham Lincoln once gave a speech here and now it is a popular stop for candidates because it is an old-fashioned New England building.

St. Anselm College (Goffstown): This college hosts lots of debates and holds a famous breakfast for candidates called "Politics and Eggs."

Lindy's Diner (Keene): Candidates love to stop at this diner to take pictures and eat pancakes.

Union Leader Offices (Manchester): The biggest newspaper in New Hampshire is an important source for information about the candidates.
