7 ANTED some able Volunteers, to complete the Number in the Garflon of His Majesty's Castle of William and Mary, in the Province of New Hampshire; the Men in this Garrison are provided with a compleat Suit of Regimentals once a Year ;-They also receive three Dollars per Month pay, and five shillings lawful Money per Week for billeting; - Any Perfons inclineable to enter into this Service, are defired to apply to John Cochran, Efq; Commander of the faid Castle at the Earl of Halifax Tavern in Portsmouth.





What is this document?

This is a newspaper advertisement from the New Hampshire Gazette, asking for soldiers to come work at Fort William and Mary, a British fort in Portsmouth.

This advertisement was published on April 17, 1772 by Captain John Cochran, the commander of the fort.

There were only a few other soldiers assigned to work with Captain Cochran, so he put this advertisement in the newspaper to try and get more soldiers to man the fort.



Fun Fact:

Forts were sometimes called castles, which is why the name of this fort appears as "Castle of William and Mary" in the advertisement.
