## Local Government Then and Now – Possible Responses

1. What similarities do you notice between the two warrants?

**Answers will vary depending on which modern warrant is chosen for comparison, but students should notice that the layout and language used in both warrants are similar and that they both detail everything to be discussed in the town meeting.**

2. What differences do you see?

**Answers will vary, but using the 2025 Hopkinton example provided, students may notice that there is a place for people to cast their vote and that there are vote counts for each article detailing whether the Select Board and Budget Committee recommend the Article to pass. There are also notes about how each article will affect the tax rates citizens pay.**

3. What similar issues do you notice from the 1841 town meeting that are also being addressed today?

**Examples of similar issues may be:**

- **Voting for local, state, and federal representatives**
- **Budget discussions, including what needs to be paid for and where that money should come from**
- **Transportation, building, and zoning concerns – whether citizens think that land in the town should be sold, rented, turned into a road, or designated for particular use**
- **Public Safety – police, fire**

4. How will community involvement help resolve these concerns?

**Citizens of these towns get a direct say in what happens in the town. Not only do they elect representatives to serve them at the state, federal, and local levels, they also are able to directly vote on what happens to the land and resources of their community. Town meetings are a chance for the community members to decide what they think is best for their town and make their opinions heard. If everyone agrees something should change, then the town meeting is when they can plan to make it happen.**
