## CHANGING THE PRIMARY IN 1948

## **Primary Benefits**

From 1920 through 1948, the New Hampshire presidential primary received little notice. That's because voters were only choosing delegates to the national nominating conventions. The candidates' names appeared nowhere on the ballot! Consequently, there was no incentive for the presidential candidates to campaign in New Hampshire—and therefore there was no media attention.

This all changed beginning with the 1952 presidential primary. Three years earlier, then-New Hampshire House Speaker Richard Upton proposed legislation to include candidates' names on the ballot. This, he reasoned, would give the primary more meaning and spike voter interest, which had bottomed out to a paltry 18% of registered voters in the 1944 primary. Upton never envisioned, nor necessarily sought for New Hampshire, all of the ensuing media attention that the primary has received over the years.

The rest, as they say, is history.
