TIMELINE: U.S. IMMIGRATION LAWS



Most of the rules about immigration are decided by each state, and there aren't many rules about who can come to America.

The U.S. government sets immigration rules for the entire country and controls who can immigrate to America.

1776

America declares independence from Great Britain.

1815

Lots of people start to immigrate to America, about 6,000 people a year.

U.S. Supreme Court decides the U.S. government should handle American immigration.

1907

U.S. immigration reaches its peak with 25,000 people a day going through Ellis Island.

1965

U.S. government passes
a new immigration
law that allows more
people from the rest
of the world to come
to America.

1790

U.S. government says anyone who lives here is a citizen as long as they are white.

1840s

More than 1 million Irish immigrate to America to escape the potato famine.

1891

U.S. government creates the U.S. Immigration Service to oversee people coming to America. Ellis Island opens the following year, in 1892.

1924

U.S. government passes a new immigration law that limits how many people can come to America. More immigrants from European countries are allowed to enter than people from the rest of the world.
